





Collaboratively reviewed cases most often result in referral to community-based accountability (CBA)

Percent of total referrals offered CBA (after legal review)






Advancing equity: reduced racial disparities in youth offered community-based accountability




Advancing equity: reduced racial disparities in youth succeeding in community-based accountability




Disaggregated success rates in community accountability improved in Year 2 for Black, Latine and White youth*



Disaggregated success rates in community accountability improved in Year 2 for males and older youth*




Primary decisions on youth cases referred by law enforcement over time

Reflections from community providers...

Youth came in with having already spoken to dad about incident. Dad was very involved from the beginning in having conversations with his son to discuss the impact on him. The youth had just lost his mom the past fall...The youth is a forthright young person and shared honestly what happened and took accountability for his actions...The Community Member really supported youth and dad on this journey ... The youth wrote an apology letter to the victim and his dad and discussed how to walk away from friendships that go down the wrong path. Dad and his son both expressed how much this process helped their relationship.

"Youth became emotional when recounting the story that she and her cousin had been bullied by the young man and that she sprayed him because she wanted it to stop. She stated she regrets the action and had never done this before... She had already addressed the issue with mom and has a plan for future incidences. She is keenly aware that bullying is a problem in schools; adults need to listen and take action."

Youth was not proud of what he did, and did not know it would have an impact like this. We held a circle with a person impacted at school. The young person is a good writer so we thought it would be great if he could write a reflection letter to reflect on his decisions, thoughts/feelings. His reflection letter was outstanding, powerful, and emotional. We also made a plan for him to create an even stronger relationship with his mother, including going on a hike together.
