Current alerts in the world of scams

In the month of May and June the Ramsey County Sheriff's Office has noticed a lot of impersonator scams that have grabbed our attention.



Your Bank Account has been Hacked!

There have been multiple reports with victims losing \$30,000 to up to \$500,000. The scammers are calling and stating they are from your bank and give the name of a person who works there. Using their charm and the art of persuasion, these scammers convince the caller that if they don't move their money out of their account, the real hacker could take it all. The scammers

have had the victims withdraw their money and turn it into bitcoin or cash. Another victim was told to

purchase gold in which they stated it would be deposited into a new and safe account. The scammers had a courier go to the victims' homes to pick up the gold.

Once the scammers get the cash, bitcoin, or gold, it is very difficult for Law Enforcement to track or trace where it goes to find the scammers.

So, what do you do if you get this call?

- Hang up!
- Call your bank using a known and trusted number to confirm your account is safe and to ask if the person you spoke to works there.
- Talk to someone you know. Scammers target those who are isolated and don't talk much to others in the community.



• Educate and tell your story. As the scammers call, they get more creative. When you tell your story you are also teaching others about the newest ways the scammers are coming after us.

Remember that you are never alone, and we all fall victim to a scam at one point. If you do send money, please call and make a report with your local law enforcement agency and at the <u>FTC.gov</u>

Water Safety

Pools

While watching your local news you may have noticed the reporting of youth and drownings specifically in pools. The US Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) annual report showed that since 2021 there has been a 12% increase in fatal drownings of children under the ages of 15. Within most of the CPSC date reflects that the most at risk for drowning is 5 years of age or younger.

Per Pool Safely, Parents and caregivers can follow these simple steps to keep children safer in and around the water:



- Never leave a child unattended in or near water, and always designate an adult Water Watcher. This person should not be reading, texting, using a phone or being otherwise distracted. In addition to pools and spas, this warning includes bathtubs, buckets, decorative ponds, and fountains.
- If you own a pool or spa, install layers of protection, including barriers to prevent an unsupervised child from accessing the water. Homes can use door alarms, pool covers, and self-closing, self-latching devices on fence gates and doors that access pools.
- Learn how to perform CPR on children and adults. Many communities offer online CPR training.
- Learn how to swim and teach your child how to swim.
- Keep children away from pool drains, pipes, and other openings to avoid entrapments.
- Ensure any pool and spa you use has drain covers that comply with federal safety standards. If you do not know, ask your pool service provider about safer drain covers.

Boating

As Minnesotans we embrace the short summer season with getting out on our many bodies of water for sport activities; swimming, kayaking, paddle boarding, and boating. As some of you will remember to put on their life jackets, many tend to not wear them or forget to even put them in the boat. The MN DNR has **five reminders to stay safe** as you launch your boat into the water this summer with your family and friends:

- <u>Wear your life jacket</u> and make sure children wear theirs.
 - All children under 10yrs are required to wear an approved life jacket when the boat is underway.
- <u>Stay sober</u>. Booze and boating don't mix. Alcohol is the #1 factor in boating fatalities.
- <u>Tell a friend.</u> Tell someone where you're going and when you will be back. If you're not back, they should call 911. Bring a phone or VHF radio.
- <u>Be weather aware</u>. Don't let a storm sneak up on you delay your trip or head to shore. Go slow in rough water to avoid capsizing.
- <u>Boat smart.</u> Take a boating safety course. Know your boat; stay alert while scanning for dangers; stay seated and low in the boat to prevent falls overboard.

CERT Academy – Community Emergency Response Training



The Ramsey County Sheriff's Office will be conducting a CERT Academy this Fall for **NEW** students.

The 2024 CERT Academy training sessions will be held starting September 18, 2024, through November 13th, 2024. The sessions are held on Wednesday evenings from 6:30-9:30 pm for nine consecutive weeks.

Classes are limited to 25 students. The CERT Program is available to all residents of the State of Minnesota who are 18 years and older. Participants must pass a criminal background check. Participants must commit to the entire nine-week session.

Applications will be accepted through August 1st, 2024, on first-come-first-served basis.

Hot vehicles and pets

Warm weather can, literally, be a killer for a dog left inside a car. On warm days the inside of a car heats up very quickly. When it's 85 degrees out, the temperature inside a car – even with the windows left slightly open – can soar to 102 degrees in 10 minutes, and reach 120 in just half an hour.

Even leaving your dog for "just a minute" may be too long. A dog's normal body temperature ranges from 101 to 102.5 degrees. Dogs can withstand a body temperature of 107 to 108 degrees for only a very short time before suffering brain damage – or even death.

Then add the fact that most pets are not properly restrained while in the car, and you've got some dangerous situations – for people and pets

alike. Unrestrained pets can be seriously or fatally injured, or could even hurt you, in a collision or sudden braking situation. In addition, they're a distraction for the driver, which increases the risk of driver errors.



Please don't become another statistic: only take your pets in the vehicle with you when you absolutely need to, and always properly restrain your pets while in the vehicle.

Hot pavement reminder. Paved surfaces collect solar energy and become very warm (hot) quickly as the day progresses. Avoid walking your dog on hot paved surfaces – the pads on their feet can blister with the heat causing serious injuries.

Fireworks

Celebrations throughout the year from New Years Eve, Graduations, and 4th of July, brings reminders of what is legal and illegal in the State of Minnesota for fireworks. Unlike many of our surrounding states, fireworks that explode, or are aerial are not legal in the state of Minnesota per <u>MN State</u> <u>Statute 624.20</u>. Please review the <u>MN State Fire Marshal</u>'s list below and keep your family and friends safe this summer as you celebrate.

 than 100 grams of mixture per item Other sparkling items which are nonexplosive and nonaerial and contain 75 grams or less of chemical mixture per tube or a total of 500 grams or less for multiple tubes and include: <u>Cylindrical fountain</u> Upon ignition, a shower of colored sparks or smoke and sometimes a whistling effect is produced. <u>Cone Fountain</u> The effect is the same as that of a cylindrical fountain. When more than 1 cone is mounted on a common base, total pyrotechnic composition may not exceed 500 grams <u>Illuminating Torch</u> <u>Wheel</u> - Pyrotechnic device intended to be attached to a post or tree by means of a nail or string. Upon ignition, the wheel revolves, producing a shower of color and sparks and, sometimes, a whistling effect <u>Ground Spinner</u> - Small device venting out an orifice usually on the side of the tube. Similar in operation to a wheel but intended to be placed flat on the ground and ignited. The rapidly spinning device produces a shower of sparks and color. <u>Flitter Sparkler</u> - Narrow paper tube attached to a stick or wire that produces color and sparks upon ignition. The paper at one end of the tube is ignited to make the device function. <u>Flash/Strobe</u> - Emit a bright light Novelty items such as snakes and glow worms, smoke devices, or trick noisemakers which include paper streamers, party poppers, string poppers, snappers, and drop pops, each consisting of not more than twenty-five hundredths grains of explosive mixture.	 Any fireworks that are explosive Any fireworks that are aerial Firecrackers (any size) Ladyfingers Sky rockets Bottle rockets Missile type rockets Helicopters, aerial spinners, planes, UFOs Roman Candles Mines or shells (heavy cardboard or paper tube(s) attached to a base – upon ignition stars, balls or reports are propelled into the air) Chasers Parachutes 1.3G Display (special or class B) Fireworks Aerial shells Theatrical pyrotechnics (see Minn. Stat. 624.20 to 624.25) Basically, any fireworks listed above are still not legal for public sale, possession or use, except with a permit and by a certified operator according to Minnesota Statute 624.20. (i.e. these fireworks are still not legal unless a permit has been issued by the local jurisdiction and they are used by a state certified operator)

Neighborhood participation

Neighborhoods are also encouraged to combine Parties or invite other blocks to join your party, especially if that block is not planning a NTU party.

Send invitations to all neighbors by mail, email, or by phone.



First Responders

Once your party is registered, the Sheriff's Office:

- Provides safety materials.
- Coordinates efforts to have either deputies, firefighters, city, or public safety personnel come to your event.
